POLICE ADVICE

ROAD RACING AND CAR MEETS

Police advice is to encourage the local community to report anti-social use of vehicles by calling 101 quoting **Op Chromium** so this can be filtered down to local Policing units. This can also be done online.

In an emergency or if dangerous driving is witnessed always call 999.

'Any photo or video evidence is very useful to us especially if it shows a number plate. A top tip if filming is to speak the number plate out aloud as often they are difficult to see afterwards. We can then complete follow up action and have already reported drivers for various offences after a car meet following information received.'

Please remember first and foremost to never put yourself or others at any risk in attempting to gather evidence.

ROOKSDOWN POLICE SURGERIES

Local police surgeries give residents the opportunity to ask questions or discuss issues directly with our local PCSO (Police Community Support Officer). Dates are often at quite short notice so please keep an eye out on noticeboards, Facebook, or the Parish Council website.

COUNTY ON POTHOLES

Our County Councillor is conscientious in providing updates as to the whys and wherefores of Hampshire's strategic approach to repairing potholes. So to share here some extracts from Cllr Mummalaneni's reports...

Why so many? Last winter's cycles of heavy rain and frosts were more perfect than usual for potholes. Freeze - thaw action of water in cracks rapidly weakens and break open road surfaces. Then there is the hydraulic effect of vehicle tyres constantly going over standing water in cracks and other small surface defects – which is why potholes are continuing to develop and why some of the temporary fixes are beginning to break down.

Why the temporary fixes? Due to the sheer number of potholes, HCC's Highways team took the decision to keep roads serviceable and safe with emergency infill repairs because four to seven temporary infills take the time of one more permanent fix.

But... replacing the temporary fixes and returning the highway network to its pre winter condition is likely to take most of this calendar year. This has been helped by a Government allocation of £6M for pothole repairs.

What Hampshire does next? The County Council is planning to commit a further £22.5M to support the road repair programme in Hampshire over the next three years (£7.5M per year). As part of these proposals, contractors have been asked to adjust their working method so that when a single repair is made, smaller ones nearby can filled at the same time. The repair teams at the moment are asked to fix only the defects that pose the biggest risk. This new repairs programme and funding is due to be agreed by Cabinet on 18 July.

KINGS CORONATION CELEBRATION EVENT ROOKSDOWN – 7TH MAY 2023

The event was celebrated by different people, families, and communities each in their own special way, as did we on Sunday the 7th May 2023 at the Rooksdown Park. The event began as a quiet affair with a cloudy morning. But slowly the sun, along with our residents, came out and by afternoon the Park was packed with a now warm sun watching over. There was a variety of free entertainment for children including inflatables, interactive games, a football goal, balloon animals and crown making. Ice cream and hot food vans were on hand to replenish people's energy; all while a live brass band filled the air with familiar melodies before closing the day with *God Save The King*.

The Parish Council had an open stall on the day – along with the crown making – and were on hand to help support our residents with any queries they wished to raise.

We hope to protect these attributes, especially when considering the impact of future projects and plans. Where possible we will seek to nurture and protect green space, and seek to enable and support our community to flourish.

WHAT CONCERNS PEOPLE ABOUT ROOKSDOWN

Parking is an historical and ongoing issue in Rooksdown and other parts of Basingstoke. Hence, we continue to be mindful of the potential impact on parking of any project or planning proposal. If given the opportunity and the means, we will push to help improve the parking arrangements of the area. For example, we have negotiated to purchase the two car parks on Peggs Way for use by local residents; legal work is underway.

Roads and potholes is a hot topic... County Cllr Arun Mummalaneni has reported that, as of the end of June, all serious potholes in the area should have been temporarily fixed. Temporary fixes are quicker to implement and potholes are addressed on a priority basis, due to limited resources.



Overall, the day was a roaring success and we had lots of feedback that echoed this sentiment. We would like to thank the Borough and County Council's Coronation grant schemes for assisting us with funding for the event and would also like to say a special thank you to the Mayor Cllr Paul Miller, and Mrs Sandra Miller Mayoress, for attending. Our gratitude also extends to all the individual people and businesses who contributed to the event. Finally, we would like to thank all our residents who could attend as you were the key ingredient.


Antisocial behaviour featured highly in responses, much due to car meets and road racing on or near the A339. Concern is also driven by incidents of vandalism, the smell of recreational drugs in public spaces and anti-social behaviour in public spaces. Feedback also mentions a desire for more police patrols. A CSPO (Community Safety Patrol Officer) has confirmed they are in the process of procuring a speed camera and training officers to use it. In addition, by April 2024, each area will have its own dedicated Police Officer to help us address local concerns.

Lack of shops, restaurants and pubs — and the need for more of all of these — is a growing sentiment. The Parish Council would happily endorse, but recognises the challenge of finding suitable locations. Most residents prefer not to live next door to a shop, restaurant or pub so the scope for suitable locations is limited. Thus we will support opportunities for new businesses to come to the area while being mindful of impact on residents' amenity and well being.

Street lighting is an ongoing issue the Parish Council is actively tracking. We are working with Ward Councillor Jay Ganesh to try to help with this. Jay has expressed similar concerns and carries out his own surveys on the non working lights in the Barratt David Wilson Homes part of Rooksdown to identify faults and seek their redress. Members of the Parish Council also proactively survey and report faulty streetlights. Jay has been engaging the companies responsible for street lighting – which depends on the location – and is monitoring progress.

SQUIRREL WOOD FROM TRUMPET JUNCTION

To some people in Rooksdown, 'Squirrel Wood' may not mean very much, let alone where it is and interestingly how it came about. The latter may be of particular interest to those who now live in Squirrel Wood, as it may answer questions as to how a small area of land nestling at the edge of Rooksdown by the A339 is now an almost complete and self-contained



community of 122 properties. And yet the only way out of Squirrel Wood is through Rooksdown.

Indeed, for those who moved into Rooksdown some 10 or more years ago there was no such place as Squirrel Wood. (Acknowledging that before April 2004, there was no Parish of Rooksdown.) But we were soon to learn that the area of land north of the A339 – which had originally been identified to play a major role in the junction of Ringways West and North, and was subsequently not required – went under the name of Trumpet Junction.

As we now know, this did not take place, but it left the land originally allocated to the northern end of the junction unused. Thus, in 2011, planning approval was given for this area of land – which then became known as 'Land Adjoining The Spinney, Park Prewett, Aldermaston Road, Basingstoke'.

Fast forward six years and a detailed planning proposal by Zero C Holdings Ltd for the 122 dwellings was approved by Basingstoke & Deane with the principal contractor being Allenbuild and their successors. So late in 2017 Squirrel Wood was begun and the rest, as they say, is history.

A continuing anomaly in an unusual history of development is that the Rooksdown Parish Boundary, drawn in 2004, continues to show Squirrel Wood to be outside the Parish. The Boundary Commission for England are responsible for keeping under review the electoral boundaries. The 2018 review of Basingstoke and Deane Ward Boundaries included Squirrel Wood within the Ward and electorate of Sherborne St John and Rooksdown – but the line of the Parish administrative boundary as shown on the map hasn't been changed. This is something to be addressed at the next Boundary review.

Hence, and not before time perhaps, these are a few words of welcome to Rooksdown's residents in Squirrel Wood. This Summer edition of the *Rooksdown Reporter* will be the first to be hand delivered; from now on you will receive issues as and when published. Please contact the Parish Council if you have any issues to raise and particularly if you would like something included in a future issue of the *Reporter*.

For those of us looking over to our new neighbours while walking through The Spinney, we might have learnt a little more about a locality which has more than squirrels in the shaping of its recent past.

MAKING ROOKSDOWN A GREAT, SAFE PLACE TO LIVE ...

THE WHITE BRIDGE

The Parish Council has been working with Hampshire County Council for some time to improve the lighting on the White Bridge over the A339 from Rooksdown in to Winklebury as part of our commitment to making it safer. This work has already made a significant improvement to the lighting of that area.

At the end of last year you will have seen that HCC Arboriculture Team carried out tree clearance to improve visibility for pedestrians using the steps or footpath. One of the lamp post columns has been relocated and an additional column has been installed at the foot of the footpath

The final part of the project will be a section of illuminated LED handrail on the pedestrian ramp from the base to the top of steps. It will look great and installation is scheduled for 31 July.

We appreciate the support of County Councillor, Arun Mummalaneni with regards to this project.

SILENT SOLDIER

You will soon see a World War I Tommy outline statue standing by the wall at the entrance to Rooksdown from the Avenue Roundabout. Thanks to Basingstoke & Deane Borough Council, who maintain this area, for their permission to install the outline soldier on a concrete and brick plinth.
